

## WHAT IS A WALENTAS SCHOLARSHIP?

Walentas Scholarships provide the full cost of attendance for four years of study at the University of Virginia, as well as a robust enrichment program, including study abroad and internships.

WHO ARE WALENTAS SCHOLARS?

Walentas Scholars are first-generation college students who demonstrate potential for impact as leaders, scholars, and citizens. They are first or among the first in their families to earn a bachelor's degree from a college or university.

## HOW DO I BECOME A WALENTAS SCHOLAR?

Candidates for the Walentas Scholarship must be nominated by their high schools by December 1.

Once nominated, successful candidates will undergo a series of interviews in front of Foundation-appointed selection committees.



Thanks to a \$100 million gift from U.Va. alumnus David Walentas and his wife, Jane, the Jefferson Scholars Foundation was able to launch a new merit-based scholarship program aimed at attracting the most talented first-generation students to the University of Virginia. The Walentas Scholars Program will welcome its first cohort of Scholars to U.Va. in fall 2022.
