

The Digital SAT Suite of Assessments












Meeting the Evolving Needs of Students and Educators

With input from educators and students, College Board is adapting the SAT[®] Suite of Assessments (SAT, PSAT/NMSQT[®], PSAT[™] 10, PSAT[™] 8/9) to ensure we continue to meet their evolving needs. The digital SAT will allow every student—regardless of where they go to high school—to access opportunities and scholarships. While the SAT is largely optional for college admissions, we want it to be the best possible option for students to show their strengths.

When Will Students Take the Digital Test?

We will administer the SAT digitally at international test centers beginning in spring of 2023 and at U.S. schools and test centers beginning in spring of 2024.

- Most students take the SAT for the first time in spring of their junior year of high school.
 - ◆ So students testing internationally in the class of 2024 will be the first to take the digital SAT.
 - ◆ In the U.S., students in the high school class of 2025 will be the first class to take the digital test.
- Students everywhere will take the digital PSAT 8/9 and PSAT/NMSQT starting in fall 2023. They will take the digital PSAT 10 starting in spring of 2024.

What's Staying the Same?

- The SAT Suite will continue to measure the knowledge and skills that students are learning in high school and that matter most for college and career readiness.
- The SAT will still be scored on a 1600 scale and educators and students can continue to track growth across the Suite over time.
- The digital SAT will still be administered in a school or in a test center with a proctor present—not at home.
- Students will still have free, world-class practice resources on Khan Academy®.
- Students will continue to connect directly to scholarships.
- We'll continue to support all students, including those who need accommodations on test day.

What's Changing?

- The SAT will be shorter—about two hours instead of three.
- Students and educators will receive scores faster—in days, not weeks.
- Calculators will be allowed on the entire Math section.
- To reflect the range of paths that students take after high school, digital SAT Suite score reports will also connect students to information and resources about local two-year colleges, workforce training programs, and career options.
- Students will take the SAT Suite of Assessments on a laptop or tablet. If students don't have a device, we'll provide one to use on test day.
- A digital SAT will be more secure and flexible. Each student gets a unique test form, and states, districts, and schools will have more flexibility for where, when, and how often they administer the SAT.
