

Adolescent Mental Health Levels of Care

Treatment Begins with a clinical evaluation of the person's current mental health, their ability to perform daily tasks, and overall safety. Mental health professionals use evidenced-based measures to propose treatment that is most helpful and lest disruptive (clinically and medically necessary). Use this table as a guidepost to understanding the different levels of care available to teens to support their mental health needs.

Levels of Care at Bright Path Behavioral Health

Admission to Bright Path is based on clinical need, determined through a collaborative, evidence-based process with the teen, caregivers, and providers. Guided by integrity, we're transparent about care recommendations and treatment fit. If our team believes a teen would thrive elsewhere, we communicate that clearly and promptly. Bright Path offers two outpatient levels of care—each a temporary stop designed to help teens build skills, reconnect with their lives, and prepare for ongoing outpatient support. The table below outlines the differences between these two paths:
