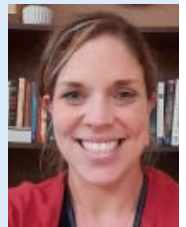
Jenny Hubler, Hungary Creek Middle School

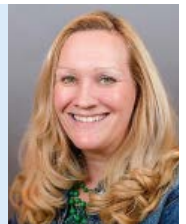

ABOUT THIS SESSION: Child and adolescent anxiety is ubiquitous and on the rise. Working with anxious kids (and their parents) is stressful and can feel like a never-ending uphill battle. In this fun session, participants will learn more about anxiety, and will build skills so that they can better support anxious kids. We will focus on coping skills and building resilience so that school counselors can help teens to turn down anxiety and re-engage in life.

SPEAKER BIO: Tori Stone, PhD, LPC, has 24 years of experience as a school counselor, counselor educator, and national presenter. As an Associate Professor and the Clinical Coordinator of the Counseling program at George Mason University, Dr. Stone trains both School and Clinical Mental Health Counseling students in counseling skills and theories, creative counseling interventions and practical, theory-based approaches to work with children, teens, and adults. Dr. Stone has delivered more than 400 presentations at the local, state, and national level on Anxiety and Depression, Trauma Informed Education, Brain Development and the Nervous System, Creativity in Counseling, Child and Adolescent Mental Health, and many other related topics. She is known for her creative presentation style, humor, and approachable expertise.

The Transformative Role of School Counselors: Inspiring Student Success through Hope and Belonging

Brett Zyromski



ABOUT THIS SESSION: In this keynote, we will explore how centering the assets and strengths of students, families, and communities can transform school counseling programs and schools to drive positive student outcomes. Attendees will gain practical strategies to cultivate these strengths, fostering the critical elements of hope and belonging. Hope is a stronger predictor of post-secondary achievement than ACT, SAT scores, or high school GPAs, while a sense of belonging can revolutionize school culture into a catalyst for student success. Join us to reenergize your school counseling practices and create environments that embrace cultural strengths and family assets—fueling hope and belonging to support every student’s holistic growth and lifelong success.

SPEAKER BIO: Brett Zyromski is an award-winning Associate Professor and Program Chair of the Counselor Education Program at The Ohio State University. His scholarship focuses on how school-based counselors can enhance protective factors and positive childhood experiences for students that have experienced adverse childhood experiences, while at the same time deconstructing the systems that create the need for such interventions. His research also explores the impact of socially-just evidence-based interventions in school counseling, and socially-just evidence-based school counselor education and evaluation in school counseling. He currently serves as an Associate Editor for the Professional School Counseling journal. Dr. Zyromski has published over 40 peer-reviewed articles and book chapters related to school counseling issues, delivered over 150 international, national, regional, and local presentations and has served as numerous international and state conference keynote. A research Fellow at the University of Massachusetts Ronald H. Fredrikson Center for School Counseling Outcome Research and Evaluation and a Faculty Affiliate at The Ohio State University Center on Education and training for Employment, Dr. Zyromski is also co-editor of *School Counseling Research: Advancing the Professional Evidence Base* (2023) and co-author of *Facilitating Evidence-Based, Data-Driven School Counseling: A Manual for Practice* (Corwin, 2016). He co-founded and is co-chair of the annual Evidence-Based School Counseling Conference (ebscc.org). Dr. Zyromski has been recognized with numerous leadership and teaching awards, served as keynote for multiple international, national, and state conferences, and he has served as co-primary investigator or project manager for over \$12,000,000 worth of federal and state grants.

Code-Switching for Authentic Connection

Diana Virgil

ABOUT THIS SESSION: Gain a deeper understanding of code-switching to effectively engage with your students in an authentic manner. Explore the various masks individuals wear, including generational gaps and cultural differences, and learn strategies to connect with students and colleagues. Diana Virgil, 2024 School Counselor of the Year, also delves into human growth and development, focusing on working with parents/guardians and diverse family structures to enhance your school counseling approach.

After attending the session, you will be able to:

- Develop a clear understanding of code-switching to authentically connect with students
- Explore the diverse masks individuals wear, including generational and cultural influences, to foster connections with students and colleagues
- Gain insights into human growth and development in the context of working with parents and diverse family structures

SPEAKER BIO: Virgil has been a school counselor since 2015 and works on a campus that serves 346 students in grades 9–12. She is the 17th person to receive the national recognition and the first from Alabama. Virgil received her bachelor's, master's and educational specialist degrees from Mississippi College and a doctorate degree from University of the Cumberland. She is an ASCA-Certified School Counselor, a National Certified School Counselor and a National Certified Counselor.

Many Daleville High School students are trailblazers in their families, aiming to be the first to graduate from high school. When Virgil was hired, she noticed a significant number of students weren't participating in dual-enrollment classes due to a lack of awareness, limited college aspirations, transportation challenges and financial constraints. Virgil promptly established a partnership with the local community college to boost student enrollment. A significant turning point came when the college received a grant to provide eligible students with free tuition and books for dual enrollment, revolutionizing the opportunities for students to earn both high school and college credit. To address transportation challenges, Virgil worked with the college to implement online courses and enlisted teachers to teach dual enrollment courses at the high school. Her approaches increased the number of students in dual-enrollment courses from four to more than 40 each semester. This year, the school is on the cusp of graduating its first student with a high school diploma and an associate degree in science, along with its first student with a mechatronics certification from the aviation college. As a result of Virgil's extensive collaboration and advocacy efforts, Daleville High School now offers dual-enrollment courses in science, English and math. For Virgil, the most rewarding part of her work as a school counselor is the opportunity to be a support system for her students.

Makenzie Perkins

SPEAKER BIO: Makenzie Perkins, MS, currently serves as the Counseling Specialist for Collierville Schools (TN). In this role she is responsible for coordinating and supervising school counseling, threat assessment, health facility transitions, and crisis response across the district. Previously she served as the Prevention Counselor at Collierville High School, where she helped students and staff navigate mental health concerns and crises at the largest high school in the state.



Makenzie is a National Certified Counselor and earned her Master of Science degree and Clinical Mental Health Specialist degree from the University of Memphis. She is also the author of *30-Minute Groups: Grief*. Makenzie is passionate about training professionals in the areas of threat assessment and management, suicidality, school safety, loss and grief, and understanding the everchanging mental health needs of today's youth.

Beyond the Screen: Responding Effectively to Suicidal Ideation

ABOUT THIS SESSION: School counselors are uniquely positioned to be front line responders to students presenting in crisis. This workshop is designed to enhance a school counselor's knowledge on current suicide statistics, explore strategies to provide effective screening, and demonstrate how to create meaningful safety plans. Special emphasis will be placed on empowering student voice through this process.

The Colors of Loss: 10 Expressive Counseling Techniques that Work

ABOUT THIS SESSION: Did you know new studies estimate 1 in 12 children will lose a parent or sibling before the age of 18? This presentation will allow school counselors to leave with creative ways to help students process their own grief journeys. A variety of expressive counseling techniques will be explored (and practiced!) that can be utilized in both individual and group sessions for all ages. Although we can't control if a student experiences loss and grief, we can help give their grief a voice.
